

**SUMMARY:**

The proposed rule would implement commercial fishing reporting procedures for a web-based electronic fish harvest reporting system that utilizes current technology and meets recommendations requested by the commercial fishing industry in the June 2000 Commercial Fisheries Task Force. The rule revises code language for reporting elements that are identical on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior and it allows commercial fishers the option of continuing to report their fishing activity via a paper biweekly report or to use the new electronic fish harvest system to report daily.

**RECOMMENDATION:** That the Board adopt Board Order FH-13-14.

SUBJECT: Background memo on Board Order FH-13-14, relating to implementing a web-based electronic fish reporting system for licensed commercial fishers of the Great Lakes

**1. Subject of Proposed Rule:**

The proposed rule implements commercial fishing reporting procedures for a web-based electronic fish harvest reporting system that utilizes current technology and meets recommendations requested by many commercial fishers and by the commercial fishing industry in the June 2000 Commercial Fisheries Task Force.

**2. Background:**

The current administrative code directs Great Lakes commercial fishers to use a discontinued, obsolete fish harvest reporting system and is not applicable to the next reporting system under development. The revised rules will create the necessary procedures and will allow the Great Lakes commercial fishers to use the new system for recording and reporting all elements of their commercial catch. Recognizing that a small percentage of the commercial fishers may not own computers or may not be comfortable with electronically submitting their daily fishing activity reports, the department will allow these commercial fishers to continue reporting with the current biweekly paper system until they decide to retire from the industry or become comfortable with use of the new technology.

A U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service grant was obtained to develop the new web-based reporting system that will allow Great Lakes commercial fishers to electronically submit their daily fishing activity reports directly to the department via computers and eventually smart phones. The new web-based system was ready for testing in early 2015.

**3. Why is the rule being proposed?**

The new electronic reporting system will streamline the process and provide efficiencies for fishers as well as the department by reducing the need to fill out and enter paper reports by hand. It should also provide greater accuracy of harvest reporting. Commercial fishers will be entering, proofing and certifying all of their own daily commercial fishing activity data.

The overall goal is to improve compliance with Wisconsin's commercial fishing regulations and enhance the management of the Great Lakes fisheries resources.

**4. Summary of the rule:**

- Defines electronic communication device, which are devices such as computers, tablets, smart phones or other devices that commercial fishers may use to access and submit required fish harvest reports.
- Removes redundant language involving identical rules for Lake Superior and Lake Michigan and removes directions for commercial fishers to use a discontinued, obsolete fish harvest reporting system.

- Creates a single section of code for reporting elements that are identical on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior and keeps in place the additional reporting of estimated pounds of each fish species caught for commercial fishers on Lake Michigan and Green Bay.
- Allows commercial fishers the option of continuing to report their fishing activity via a paper biweekly report or to use the new electronic fish harvest system to report daily.
- Creates new directions for an updated electronic fish harvest reporting system that will allow commercial fishers to use their own electronic communication devices for accessing the system and submitting reports that are required under state statute.

**5. How does this proposal affect existing policy?**

Existing policy will remain in place, but the rule updates the methods to collect information related to managing commercial fishing and the overall management of Great Lakes fisheries resources.

**6. Has the Board dealt with these issues before?**

The Board approved rule language in 2008/2009 to implement an electronic reporting system. However, the department was unable to develop the expected system because of technology and budget constraints, resulting in commercial fishers continuing to report their daily fishing activities via the biweekly paper reports. At that time, information technology requirements prohibited non-DNR computers from connecting to and submitting data directly to the DNR network. Policies and technology have been updated to allow this new system to be implemented.

**7. Who will be impacted by the proposed rule? How?**

Licensed commercial fishers in Lake Michigan, Green Bay, and Lake Superior will be affected. This rule is intended to benefit commercial fishers by allowing them to submit fish harvest reports using computers or other devices that can access the reporting system. The rule also allows those who do not wish to use the system to continue using the current paper reporting process. There is no harvest quota or fishing effort changes included in the rule.

**8. Soliciting public input on economic impact synopsis**

No adverse economic impact is anticipated as a result of this rule change. If commercial fishers do not own or have ready access to an Internet connected computer, they will be allowed to continue reporting via the existing biweekly paper reporting system.

The department conducted an economic impact analysis to determine if any individuals, businesses, local governments, or other entities expect to be affected economically. No comments were received during the economic impact open comment period July 20 to August 3, 2015.

**9. Environmental Analysis**

The process for permanent administrative rules is an equivalent analysis action under NR 150.20(2)(a)20., and no additional environmental analysis is required.

**10. Small Business Analysis**

This rule is intended to be a benefit to small businesses active in commercial fishing on the Great Lakes. The proposed rule includes improved options for reporting requirements, as requested by many commercial fishers. However, the department will also allow commercial fishers to continue reporting with the current biweekly paper system. No design or operational standards are contained in the rule.

**11. Response Summary - Public Hearing Comments**

Two public hearings were held, one on October 13 in Green Bay at which three people attended and another on October 15 in Bayfield at which two people attended. No public comment was offered by those appearing at either of the public hearings; one person registered as “opposed” and the remaining

4 attendees registered “as interest may appear.” At both public hearings, attendees primarily asked clarifying questions regarding the proposed rule changes.

In addition, three written comments were received by the department:

- A Zone 3 (southern) Lake Michigan commercial fisher wrote “*in favor of paper reporting and/or electronic reporting on a monthly basis.*” rather than either the current bi-weekly paper reporting or the proposed daily electronic reporting. This person also advocated for elimination of the existing estimated catch reporting requirement on Lake Michigan that is retained under the provisions of FH-13-14.

**Department response:** The Commercial Fish Task Force recommended the “daily reporting” requirement to facilitate DNR law enforcement monitoring of commercial fishers to ensure compliance with accurate reporting of fish harvest weights. Provisions are made within the existing and the proposed reporting rules to accommodate commercial fishers who are unable to meet the daily midnight deadline for filing the electronic daily fishing activity report. In regards to his second comment, the existing requirement of recording an estimate catch weight upon completing the last net lift and before starting for shore is retained as a critical component to DNR law enforcement’s monitoring of commercial fish harvest at the dockside when the catch is landed. This rule does not address or change that existing reporting requirement.

- A Zone 2 (northern) Lake Michigan commercial fisher wrote in support of FH-13-14 and electronic reporting. However, this person objected to the requirement of having to periodically print, sign, and retain a paper copy of the data they will submit electronically. He recommended that the records be maintained electronically on the department’s electronic fish harvest reporting system.

**Department response:** DNR Bureau of Law Enforcement representative Thomas Hansen spoke with this person, acknowledging the merit of the person’s recommendation and explaining the current legal need for the requirement to print and retain paper copies. The department is in the process of seeking a federal grant to further develop the electronic reporting system software/website in order to accommodate this person’s recommendation (only maintain electronic records) and at the same time allow the electronic records to meet authentication legal requirements for use of those records in court actions.

- A Lake Superior commercial fisher’s crew member wrote in opposition to FH-13-14, erroneously believing that it was imposing the Lake Michigan requirement of carrying a report on board, entering the estimated catch prior to heading for shore, and requiring the weighing of landed catch within 30 minutes of landing.

**Department response;** DNR Bureau of Law Enforcement representative Thomas Hansen spoke with both the crew member and the Lake Superior licensee for whom he worked. Hansen explained that the proposed rule changes did not require the estimated catch weight nor does it require the weighing of all fish harvest within 30 minutes of landing (this requirement only applies to individuals convicted of multiple violations within certain time frames – it is existing law that remains unchanged and was not addressed in FH-13-14). The person was satisfied with Hansen’s explanation and acknowledged they had misread the rule proposal.

9. Policy Problem Addressed by the Rule

The current s. NR 25.13(5), Wis. Adm. Code, directs commercial fishers to use a discontinued, obsolete EFRS and is not applicable to the next generation EFRS under development. The revised rules will create the necessary procedures and allow the commercial fishers to use the new reporting system for recording and reporting all elements of their commercial catch.

10. Summary of the businesses, business sectors, associations representing business, local governmental units, and individuals that may be affected by the proposed rule that were contacted for comments.

The rule would affect licensed commercial fishers on Lake Michigan/Green Bay (65 licenses) and Lake Superior (10 licenses). The Department contacted the Lake Michigan and Lake Superior Commercial Fishing Boards, the WI Fisheries Advisory Council, the WI Conservation Congress, and similar organizations for comments on the potential economic impact of this rule. No comments were received during the open comment period July 20 to August 3, 2015.

11. Identify the local governmental units that participated in the development of this EIA.

No local governmental units requested to be involved in the preparation of this EIA.

12. Summary of Rule's Economic and Fiscal Impact on Specific Businesses, Business Sectors, Public Utility Rate Payers, Local Governmental Units and the State's Economy as a Whole (Include Implementation and Compliance Costs Expected to be Incurred)

No economic impact is anticipated as a result of this rule change. If a commercial fisher does not own or have ready access to an internet-connected computer, they will be allowed to continue reporting via the existing biweekly paper reporting system. The proposal will update rule language on how commercial fishing electronic harvest reports may be made. No harvest quota or fishing effort changes will be included in the rule.

13. Benefits of Implementing the Rule and Alternative(s) to Implementing the Rule

Multiple commercial fishers have indicated that they would prefer a web-based reporting system that would allow them to utilize computers and internet connections for filing fishing reports. A federal grant has been obtained through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to develop the new web-based EFRS that will allow Great Lakes commercial fishers to electronically submit their daily fishing activity reports directly to the department via computers - and eventually smart phones - utilizing high-speed internet carriers.

The proposed rule would implement commercial fishing reporting procedures for a web-based electronic fish reporting system that utilizes current technology and meets recommendations requested by the commercial fishing industry in the June 2000 Commercial Fisheries Task Force report.

The alternative is to repeal s. NR 25.13(5), Stats., and continue to only use the inefficient biweekly paper reporting system of ss. NR 25.13(2) and (3), Wis. Adm. Code.

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**14. Long Range Implications of Implementing the Rule**

This rule allows for an easier reporting system for commercial fishers who choose to use it. It will encourage better compliance with reporting requirements that feed into proper management of commercial and sport fish populations in the Great Lakes.

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**15. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Federal Government**

The department is not aware of any existing or proposed federal regulation that would govern commercial fishing in Wisconsin's waters.

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**16. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Neighboring States (Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota)**

Illinois has no active commercial fishing licenses on the Great Lakes; thus there are no Great Lakes reporting requirements at the current time.

Michigan commercial fishers are required to file a monthly report with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources documenting their daily fishing activity and data is similar to that required of Wisconsin Great Lakes commercial fishers. Michigan rules are similar to those proposed for Wisconsin. Michigan commercial fishes have the option of either electronically filing the report by completing and submitting a web-based form or reporting by means of a monthly paper report.

Similar to Wisconsin and Michigan, the Minnesota licensed Great Lakes commercial fishers file a monthly paper report documenting daily fishing activity. Minnesota does not have an electronic reporting system available for use by commercial fishers.

AMENDING, REPEALING AND RECREATING, AND CREATING RULES

The statement of scope for this rule, SS 093-14, was approved by the Governor on August 27, 2014, published in Register No. 705 on October 1, 2014, and approved by the Natural Resources Board on October 29, 2014. This rule was approved by the Governor on \_\_\_\_\_.

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board proposes an order to repeal NR 25.02 (50) and 25.13 (3), (4), and (5); amend 25.09 (1) (am) 3. f., 25.13 (9) (b), (11) (c) and (11) (d)(intro.), and 25.17 (2) (b); repeal and recreate 25.13 (1) and (2); and create 25.02 (18m) relating to implementing a web-based electronic fish reporting system for licensed commercial fishers of the Great Lakes and affecting small business.

**Analysis Prepared by the Department of Natural Resources**

**1. Statute Interpreted:** Sections 29.014(1), 29.041, 29.503(5)(br), and 29.519 (5) (b), Stats.

**2. Statutory Authority:** Sections 29.014(1), 29.041, 29.503(5)(br), and 29.519 (5) (b), Stats.

**3. Explanation of Agency Authority:**

Section 29.014 (1), Stats., directs the department to establish and maintain conditions governing the taking of fish that will conserve the fish supply and ensure the citizens of this state continued opportunities for good fishing.

Section 29.041, Stats., provides that the department may regulate fishing on and in all interstate boundary waters and outlying waters.

Section 29.503 (5) (br), Stats. requires each wholesale fish dealer to complete and submit an annual inventory of sturgeon and Great Lakes fish to the department.

Section 29.519 (5) (b), Stats., requires each commercial fisher to maintain and submit records to the department on their daily fishing activities in the form and manner required by the department.

**4. Related Statutes or Rules:** All of s. 29.519 (5), Stats.

**5. Plain Language Analysis:**

The proposed rule implements commercial fishing reporting procedures for a web-based electronic fish harvest reporting system that utilizes current technology and meets recommendations requested by the commercial fishing industry in the June 2000 Commercial Fisheries Task Force.

SECTION 1 defines electronic communication device, which are devices such as computers, tablets, smart phones or other devices that commercial fishers may use to access and submit required fish harvest reports.

SECTION 2 repeals a definition of “portable electronic reporting units” that are no longer provided by the department or used by commercial fishers.

SECTION 3 updates references to sections in NR 25.13, which are repealed and recreated by this rule.

SECTIONS 4 and 5 remove redundant language involving identical rules for Lake Superior and Lake

Michigan and removes directions for commercial fishers to use a discontinued, obsolete fish harvest reporting system. The new language creates a single section for reporting elements that are identical on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior, keeps in place the additional reporting of estimated pounds of each fish species caught for commercial fishers on Lake Michigan and Green Bay, and it allows commercial fishers the option of continuing to report their fishing activity via a paper biweekly report or to use the new electronic fish harvest system to report daily. It also creates new directions for an updated electronic fish harvest reporting system that will allow commercial fishers to use their own electronic communication devices for accessing the system and submitting reports that are required under state statute.

SECTIONS 6, 7, and 8 remove outdated language from code.

Note: "Electronic fish reporting system" is already defined in NR 25.02(19) as "a system established or authorized by the department for reporting daily commercial fishing activity and other required information to the department by electronic means."

**6. Summary of, and Comparison with, Existing or Proposed Federal Statutes and Regulations:**

The department is not aware of any existing or proposed federal regulation that would govern commercial fishing in Wisconsin's waters.

**7. Comparison with Similar Rules in Adjacent States:**

Illinois has no active commercial fishing licenses on the Great Lakes; thus there are no Great Lakes reporting requirements at the current time.

Michigan commercial fishers are required to file a monthly report with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources documenting their daily fishing activity and data is similar to that required of Wisconsin Great Lakes commercial fishers. Michigan rules are similar to those proposed for Wisconsin. Michigan commercial fishers have the option of either electronically filing the report by completing and submitting a web-based form or reporting by means of a monthly paper report.

Similar to Wisconsin and Michigan, the Minnesota licensed Great Lakes commercial fishers file a monthly paper report documenting daily fishing activity. Minnesota does not have an electronic reporting system available for use by commercial fishers.

**8. Summary of Factual Data and Analytical Methodologies Used and How Any Related Findings Support the Regulatory Approach Chosen:**

The current s. NR 25.13(5), Wis. Adm. Code, directs Great Lakes commercial fishers to use a discontinued, obsolete fish harvest reporting system and is not applicable to the next reporting system under development. The revised rules will create the necessary procedures and will allow the Great Lakes commercial fishers to use the new system for recording and reporting all elements of their commercial catch. Recognizing that a small percentage of the commercial fishers may not own computers or may not be comfortable with electronically submitting their daily fishing activity reports, the department will allow these commercial fishers to continue reporting with the current biweekly paper system until they decide to retire from the industry or become comfortable with use of the new technology.

A U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service grant was obtained to develop a new web-based reporting system that will allow Great Lakes commercial fishers to electronically submit their daily fishing activity reports directly to the department via computers and eventually smart phones. 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**SECTION 1. NR 25.02 (18m) is created to read:**

**NR 25.02 (18m)** “Electronic communication device” means a device with access to the internet or local networks capable of storing or replicating data on a hard drive, transmitting data over a network, displaying data on a screen, and recording data via an input apparatus.

**SECTION 2. NR 25.02 (50) is repealed.**

**SECTION 3. NR 25.09 (1) (am) 3. f. is amended to read:**

NR 25.09 (1) (am) 3. f. Allowable gill net effort limitations for period 1 shall be made available by November 1 of each year. If a commercial fisher's allowable gill net effort has not been used by the end of period 1 or 2 and is reported by the commercial fisher according to s. NR 25.13-~~(4)~~, the remaining balance of allowable gill net effort in feet of net shall be carried over to succeeding periods within the lake trout open season but not carried over to the next lake trout open season. Allowable gill net effort limitations for periods 2 and 3 shall be determined by the department within 5 working days after the start of periods 2 and 3 using remaining allowable gill net effort reported according to s. NR 25.13-~~(2)~~-~~or~~-~~(5)~~.

**SECTION 4. NR 25.13 (1) and (2) are repealed and recreated to read:**

NR 25.13 (1) PAPER REPORTING. Except as provided under sub. (2), each person required to be licensed under s. 29.519 (1m), Stats., to conduct commercial fishing operations on Lake Michigan or Lake Superior or fishing as an eligible member of the Red Cliff or Bad River Bands of Lake Superior Chippewa shall submit a biweekly fishing report to the department that includes all records of pounds of fish harvest, harvest effort, and all other information called for on the report form. All fishing activities for the preceding biweekly calendar period shall be reported in writing in the English language on forms provided for this purpose by the department and include such information as may be deemed necessary by the department for management of the fishery and to prevent depletion of the fish supply.

(a) The biweekly report shall be mailed or delivered to the department at the address provided on the form no later than the Tuesday following the biweekly reporting period. All biweekly commercial fishing reports shall be signed by the commercial fishing licensee under whose license the fish were taken.

(b) Unless otherwise authorized in writing by the department, biweekly fishing reports shall be submitted regardless of whether the person fished during the period of time covered by the report. All department copies of biweekly report forms issued to a person for the license year and not previously submitted by the person shall be returned to the department by the final reporting deadline for that license year.

Note: Biweekly fishing report forms are provided by the department to each licensee at the beginning of the license year. Additional forms may be obtained by writing: DNR, 110 South Neenah Avenue, Sturgeon Bay, WI 54235.

(c) Each person required to be licensed under s. 29.519 (1m), Stats., to conduct commercial fishing operations on Lake Michigan or Green Bay, or a member of the licensee's crew if the licensee is not present, shall carry the biweekly fishing report forms while fishing. The information pertaining to the licensee's name, address, license number or fleet reporting number, date, name and number of the boat fished from, fishing location and depth, fishing effort, gear used, and estimated pounds of each fish species caught for each fishing trip shall be recorded on the biweekly fishing report forms immediately after completing all net lifts for each trip and before starting to bring the catch to dock or shore. The report shall accompany the fish caught to dock or shore. After a trip's information has been recorded, the report may not be transported for the rest of the day in such a way that it can be altered except to record information pertaining to additional fishing trips taken that day.

(2) ELECTRONIC REPORTING. A person required to be licensed under s. 29.519 (1m), Stats., to conduct commercial fishing operations on Lake Michigan, Green Bay, or Lake Superior, in lieu of the requirements under sub. (1), may elect to submit a daily fishing report to the department that includes all records of pounds of fish harvest, harvest effort, and all other information called for on the report form by means of the electronic fish reporting system. All fishing activities for the day, including the estimated pounds of each fish species caught required pursuant to par. (f) and the weighed catch by species, shall be reported before 11:59 p.m. of each day during which the licensee engages in on-water fishing activity. Reports shall be submitted in the English language on electronic forms provided for this purpose by the department and include such information as may be deemed necessary by the department for management of the fishery and to prevent depletion of the fish supply. The daily report shall be submitted using an electronic communication device operated by the licensee or a licensee's crew member.

(a) At the request of the licensee, the department shall issue login credentials to the licensee and to any licensee crew member in order to access the electronic fish reporting system and submit reports. Unique login credentials shall be assigned to each person for whom login credentials are requested. A person shall only enter or submit a record into the electronic fish reporting system using their own department issued login credentials.

Note: Pursuant to s. 29.519 (4) (d), Stats., the licensee is responsible for all acts of crew members conducting commercial fishing activities for the licensee.

(b) Reports submitted using the electronic fish reporting system are considered approved by the licensee upon submittal.

(c) If the electronic communication device malfunctions or is unable to connect to the electronic fish reporting system, the licensee or a licensee's crew member shall immediately notify the department by calling a designated phone number or by submitting an email message to a designated email address. The licensee or licensee's crew member shall complete a paper copy of the biweekly report for that day before 11:59 p.m. the same day. Upon reestablishing the functionality of the electronic communication device or reestablishing connection with the electronic fish reporting system, the licensee or licensee's crew member shall enter the daily fishing activity information and submit it electronically to the department. The paper copy of the biweekly report shall be retained as part of the licensee's records required under s. 29.519 (5) (dm), Stats.

Note: Pursuant to s. 29.519 (6), Stats., all records of commercial fishing activity are subject to inspection upon request of a duly authorized department representative. This includes electronic records on a portable electronic communication device.

Note: The department designated phone number and email address are provided to licensees each year in a letter given with their annual commercial fishing license.

(d) For each preceding biweekly calendar period, the licensee shall print and sign a biweekly report generated by the electronic fish reporting system and retain that report as part of the licensee's records required under s. 29.519 (5) (dm), Stats. Unless otherwise authorized in writing by the department, paper biweekly fishing reports shall be printed, signed, and retained by the licensee regardless of whether the person fished during the period of time covered by the report.

(e) Except for reporting trawl fish harvest pursuant to par. (g), when the landed catch cannot be weighed by the end of the day, the licensee or crew member shall call a department designated telephone number or submit an email message to a department designated email address before 11:59 p.m. that day and notify the department of the licensee's name, commercial fishing license number or fleet reporting number, species of fish, and estimated pounds of each species and that the landed catch cannot be weighed and reported until the next day. The licensee or crew member shall then weigh the landed catch the next day and report the weight by fish species and other information required by the department on the form of the electronic fish reporting system before 11:59 pm of that day.

(f) Each person required to be licensed under s. 29.519 (1m), Stats., to conduct commercial fishing operations on Lake Michigan or Green Bay, or a member of the licensee's crew, who elects to submit a daily fishing report by means of the electronic fish reporting system shall submit a report of the fishing activity that also includes estimated pounds of each fish species caught during each fishing trip on Lake Michigan or Green Bay.

1. For each fishing trip on Lake Michigan or Green Bay, the licensee or crew member shall carry an electronic communication device and, after completing the last net lift but before starting for shore,

shall login to the electronic fish reporting system and submit the date, licensee's name, commercial fishing license number or fleet reporting number, boat name, zone of fishing, the estimated pounds of each fish species caught by zone, and any other information requested on the electronic fish reporting system for each fishing trip.

2. If the electronic communication device fails or is unable to connect to the electronic fish reporting system, the licensee or crew member shall complete a paper estimated catch report available from the department upon the completion of the last lift but before starting for shore for each fishing trip. The estimated catch report shall accompany the fish caught to dock or shore. After each trip's information has been recorded, the report may not be transported for the rest of the day in such a way that it can be altered except to record information pertaining to additional fishing trips taken that day.

3. The electronic communication device or paper copy of the estimated catch report shall accompany the fish to dock or shore and shall be immediately produced for inspection and verification of the entered record upon the request of a department representative. The paper copy of the estimated catch report shall be retained as part of the licensee's records required under s. 29.519 (5) (dm), Stats.

(g) When fishing with trawls in Lake Michigan or Green Bay, the following electronic reporting requirements also apply:

1. After the last lift of the trip and prior to returning to dock or port, a licensee or crew member fishing by trawl shall record the estimated pounds of each fish species harvested by zone as provided under par. (f).

2. Before 11:59 p.m. each day, the licensee or a crew member fishing by trawl on the waters of Green Bay shall report to the department the landed pounds of smelt and pounds of incidental catch.

3. A licensee or crew member fishing by trawl on the waters of Lake Michigan other than Green Bay, within 24 hours of landing the catch on all days except non-work days and days immediately preceding non-work days, shall electronically report to the department the landed pounds of chubs and roe intended for human consumption, pounds of smelt, and pounds of incidental catch. When trawl caught fish are landed on days that immediately precede non-work days and on non-work days, the commercial fisher or crew member shall report the landed catch within 48 hours of the estimated catch entry.

(h) Unless otherwise authorized in writing by the department, no licensee, crew member, agent, wholesale fish dealer, or other person may transport, cause to be transported, deliver, receive, or offer to deliver or receive for transportation to a location outside of Wisconsin, any fish or fish parts taken from outlying waters unless the fish have been reported as part of a weighed catch as required under this section.

The licensee shall thereafter complete the annual inventory within 10 working days preceding that designated month and day.

**NR 25.13 (11) (c)** For more than 5 violations of s. 29.503 or 29.519, Stats., or this chapter within a 36-month period or 3 or more violations of s. 29.503 or 29.519, Stats., or this chapter within a 12-month period, in addition to the requirements of par. (b), upon returning to the dock, the commercial fisher or crew member shall weigh the catch not more than 30 minutes after landing and prior to loading or moving the fish from the dock or landing site, and enter and save the species and weight in pounds of the fish in ~~the portable electronic reporting unit~~ a paper biweekly report form or the electronic fish reporting system. If the actual weight in pounds of the fish is ~~entered and saved in the portable electronic reporting unit~~ a paper biweekly report form or the electronic fish reporting system prior to returning to shore, the commercial fisher or crew member is exempt from this paragraph.

(d) In the event that the weight of the fish cannot be entered or saved due to mechanical failure or other problems associated with the ~~portable electronic reporting unit~~ electronic communication device:
