SUBJECT: LAND ACQUISITION - STATEWIDE NATURAL AREAS, STATEWIDE PUBLIC ACCESS, BRULE RIVER STATE FOREST, TURTLE FLAMBEAU SCENIC WATERS AREA AND WILLOW FLOWAGE SCENIC WATERS AREA - LANGLADE, FOREST, FLORENCE, DOUGLAS, IRON AND ONEIDA COUNTIES

FOR: AUGUST 2008 BOARD MEETING

SUMMARY: The Department has obtained an agreement to purchase 1,529.46 acres of land from the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands (BCPL) for \$2,369,500 for lands in the Statewide Natural Areas, Statewide Public Access Program, Brule River State Forest, Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area and Willow Flowage Scenic Waters Area located in Iron, Langlade, Forest, Florence, Douglas and Oneida Counties.

Department ownership of these lands will provide opportunities to improve management and to improve access to other state ownership. The parcel acreages and costs are outlined in the chart below.

Signed into law on April 19, 2006, Wisconsin Act 352 sets aside \$2,000,000 per year from 2007 through 2010 from the Stewardship fund to acquire land from BCPL. This allows the Department to preserve high quality natural area land and consolidate department land ownership for other conservation projects. Further, the legislation provides for BCPL's use of the sale proceeds to acquire working forestland for timber management and public access. The annual allocation was extended in the recent Stewardship authorization for an additional 10 years. About \$1,100,000 of the FY08 allocation for this activity has carried over to FY09.





Location:

State Natural Area – Swamp Creek Fen: The parcel is located in northern Langlade County in the Town of Ainsworth about 21 miles north of the City of Antigo.

State Natural Area – Crandon Ribbed Fen: The parcel is located in southwest Forest County in the Town of Lincoln about 1.25 miles south of Crandon.

Statewide Public Access – Edith Lake: The parcel is located in east central Florence County in the Town of Florence about 15 miles northwest of Iron Mountain, Michigan.

Brule River State Forest: The parcel is located in southeastern part of Douglas County in the Town of Highland about 40 miles southwest of Ashland and 28 miles southeast of Superior.

Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area: The parcel is located in the Township of Sherman in Iron County. The City of Hurley is located about 31 miles north of the parcel.

Willow Flowage Scenic Water Area: The parcel is located in Oneida County about 18 miles west of the City of Rhinelander.

Land and Coverture Description:

State Natural Area – Swamp Creek Fen: The land is predominately wooded with open marsh vegetation near the lake located in the southeast corner of the property. The topography is level to gently rolling.

State Natural Area – Crandon Ribbed Fen: The land consist of open fen with wooded areas along the west property line. The land is level to gently rolling with no major slopes.

Statewide Public Access – Edith Lake: The topography is gently rolling to steeply rolling. There are 2,500 feet of frontage along Edith Lake and 80 feet of frontage along both banks of Montagne Creek.

Brule River State Forest: The land is dominated by a mix of upland hardwoods, many of which are nearing harvest age. Most of the east side of the property is rolling.

Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area: The land consists of rolling to gently rolling land that is wooded.

Willow Flowage Scenic Water Area: The land is gently rolling with no major slopes and is wooded.

Zoning: Forestry, Agriculture and Shoreland.

Present Use: Currently, state-owned and managed for sustained yield timber production and public recreation.

Proposed Use: Resource Protection and Public Recreation

Tenure: The BCPL land was acquired at the beginning of statehood and with some subsequent transfers, from the federal government.

Property Taxes: All parcels are tax exempt.

Stewardship Land Access: The land will be open for public hunting, fishing, trapping, hiking, cross-country skiing, and other nature-based outdoor recreation.

2. JUSTIFICATION:

The Department proposes to acquire 1,529.46 acres of land from the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands for the Statewide Natural Areas, Statewide Public Access Program, Brule River State Forest, Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area and Willow Flowage Scenic Waters Area located in Langlade, Forest, Florence, Douglas, Iron and Oneida Counties. Department ownership of the property will provide opportunities to restore and protect wildlife habitat, provide additional opportunities for public recreation and education, and insure long-term resource protection.

Swamp Creek Fen - Statewide Natural Area:

The 80-acre property is located in northern Langlade County in the Town of Ainsworth about 21 miles north of the City of Antigo and features a diverse mosaic of community types including a high quality boreal rich fen surrounding a small alkaline bog lake. A narrow band of open black spruce and tamarack with areas of white cedar swamp surrounds the fen. This community type is unique since it is located within an area that is generally more acidic. Groundwater seepage apparently is providing a good source of calcium and magnesium bicarbonates to flow through this wetland. The fen provides habitat for a number of rare and specialized plant species, including the state threatened linear-leaved sundew. At least a dozen species of orchid have been documented within this site. Small swamp islands forested with second growth stands of spruce and fir with scattered pine punctuate the northern portion of the swamp. The fen is embedded within a wetland complex large enough to maintain most, if not all, of the ecological processes and functions necessary for long-term maintenance. The site supports the uncommon spruce grouse, a Species of Greatest Conservation Need.

Crandon Ribbed Fen – Statewide Natural Area:

The parcel, located in southwest Forest County in the Town of Lincoln about 1.25 miles south of Crandon, features a patterned peatland community, a unique and complex wetland type that contains alternating moss and sedge-dominated ridges (strings) along with saturated and inundated hollows (flarks). The strings and flarks are oriented parallel to the contours of a slope and are perpendicular to the flow of groundwater. Within a patterned peatland the peat “landforms” differ significantly in nutrient availability and pH, which thus, influences the assemblage of plant species found within the site. The fen itself is surrounded by a narrow band of open black spruce swamp and embedded in a large area of black spruce swamp. The northern portion is a very wet, floating mat with springs and creeks. The southern end features distinctive patterning and varies from wet floating to firm with water-filled pools and strings, and wet to dry and crunchy flarks. Characteristic ribbed fen species include muck sedge, few-seeded sedge, white beak rush, sundews, horned bladderwort, and yellow-eyed grass. Since patterned peatlands are only found at higher temperate and near-boreal latitudes of the northeastern and north-central United States and adjacent Canada, this is a high priority site for long-term protection.

Statewide Public Access – Edith Lake:

The 36.37-acre in Florence County will provide public access site to Edith Lake. The subject property includes 2,500 feet of frontage on Edith Lake and 80 feet of frontage along both banks of Montagne Creek. The southern 2.5-acre site will provide the location of the access site and parking area. The remaining 34 acres across Montagne Creek will provide scenic protection of the lakeshore and block in with existing public lands surrounding this lake. The property is wooded with mixed northern hardwoods and conifers. Since 1946, the Department had stocked trout in Edith Lake. This practice was discontinued a few years back, after the access location to the lake was closed in a land sale. This purchase will allow a new access site to be developed on the lake and to resume trout stocking. The county has agreed to assist in the development and the management of the access site.

The land would be acquired as part of the Statewide Public Access program, which provides public access to the state’s surface water resources. Sites are acquired for boat and canoe landings and related uses such as parking lots, shore fishing, and access to lakes, rivers and streams. If approved, the Department would seek to install a carry-in boat access site and small parking area for Edith Lake.

The subject parcel accounts for about 50% of the total lake frontage on Edith Lake. National forest land comprises about 40% of the remaining frontage to the west. Additionally, the Department holds a Forest Legacy easement on lands adjacent to the east and south of the subject property. There is a small inholding of private land on Edith Lake that includes the remaining 10% of shoreline. This land was previously owned by International Paper and was the location of the former access site used by the general public. There is no direct road access to the site, however, Florence County has acquired a parcel of land directly to the south of the subject and will be developing a road to provide the necessary access for the carry-in site.

Edith Lake is a 44-acre, drainage lake, with a maximum depth of 72 feet and an average depth of 12 feet. It has historically been managed by the Department as a stocked trout lake. In addition to trout, the lake also contains a warmwater fishery of northern pike, largemouth bass and panfish. Trout numbers have been difficult to assess by electroshocking, but it continues to be a popular trout fishing destination locally. The

outlet stream, Montagne Creek, is a brook trout stream with natural reproduction occurring. Edith Lake likely provides deep water winter habitat for Montagne Creek brook trout.

Brule River State Forest:

This 80-acre parcel located in northeastern Douglas County approximately 23 miles east of Superior abuts state-owned lands along the northern and western side. The land is dominated by a mix of upland hardwoods, many of which are nearing harvest age. Most of the east side of the property is rolling. The parcel is located about 2-½ miles east of the Bois Brule River. The Brule River, also known as the Bois Brule, is one of the best known rivers east of the Mississippi. For over a hundred years, it has been regarded as an exceptional trout stream. The Brule River contains resident brook, brown and rainbow trout. Lake, brown and rainbow (steelhead) trout along with coho and chinook salmon migrate up the Brule annually from Lake Superior.

The Brule River State Forest was initiated in 1907 when Mr. Frederick Weyerhaeuser deeded 4,320 acres to the State of Wisconsin for forestry purposes. The boundaries of the forest now have an acreage goal of 82,650 acres of which about 41,000 acres are under state ownership. This state forest is used by more diverse species of birds and mammals than any other northern Wisconsin acreage of similar size. The forest has many distinct landscapes that allow for the wide range of species such as deer, ruffed grouse, geese, bald eagles, osprey and songbirds. A majority of the public lands within the forest boundaries are open to hunting and trapping in season.

The Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area:

The proposed acquisition of 134.16-acres in the Turtle-Flambeau Scenic Waters Area consists of wooded land with a mix of swamp hardwoods, conifers and northern hardwoods. The topography is gently rolling to rolling with ridges throughout the property. A small creek runs through the southeast corner of the parcel. The parcel falls outside the project boundary, but is adjacent to it. The parcel is important in that it will provide road frontage for a block of 1,000 acres of department land currently with very poor access. The Department will add this portion to the project boundary during future planning.

The Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters Area was established in 1990 to provide opportunities for public recreation and to protect the scenic quality of the area. The Turtle Flambeau Flowage is the core of the Turtle Flambeau Scenic Waters project. The flowage is about 13,545 acres in size and is an excellent fishing lake with a wilderness character. Three rivers and several smaller creeks enter the flowage, and the North Fork of the Flambeau River is the outlet. Water flow is controlled by a dam.

Willow Flowage Scenic Water Area:

The proposed acquisition consists of eight noncontiguous blocks of land spread across 11 sections totaling 1,083.5 acres within the Willow Flowage Scenic Waters Area located in western Oneida County. Most of the parcels are located on or near that stretch of the Tomahawk River that flows between the Willow Flowage and the Rice River Flowage (Lake Nokomis) and six of the parcels are within two miles of the Willow Flowage. The land cover consists of 478 acres of upland woodlands, 232 acres of lowland woodlands and 373.5 acres of wetlands. One parcel located within the Lower Tomahawk River Pines State Natural Area includes 26,875 feet of frontage (5.09 miles) on the Tomahawk River. Additionally, there is 1,850 feet of frontage along Swamp Creek in Section 9, T36NRE. The topography of the parcels is primarily level with some gently rolling terrain. Some steeper slopes exist along some segments of Tomahawk River frontage. Currently, the property is managed for sustained yield timber production. Given that the property is within the Willow Flowage project boundary and is bordered by department ownership on most of its perimeter, this acquisition would serve well in meeting the Department's defined acquisition goals.

Entirely included in the 1,083.5 acres, the 280-acre Lower Tomahawk River Pines State Natural Area features mature stands of dry-mesic pine forest, which were historically prevalent over large portions of this ecoregion, but are now rare and diminishing. This site is one of the few tracts of relatively intact, natural origin pine forest along this portion of the Tomahawk River corridor. Historical vegetation indicates this area was part of a larger Pine Barrens ecosystem that developed on the outwash plains associated with the Lower Tomahawk and Wisconsin Rivers. Mature stands of fire origin, mixed pine forest border the lower reaches of the Tomahawk River and Swamp Creek. Associated wetlands include northern sedge meadow, alder thicket, and tamarack swamp. Scattered silver maples are found along the wide floodplain of the river. In this stretch, the Tomahawk River is wide and slow moving with a sand and muck bottom. Rare species include the

state-threatened pygmy snaketail dragonfly, which requires clean, forested, fast-flowing streams for survival. It is one of the least tolerant groups of aquatic insects to perturbations in water quality and protection of the forest river corridor will be of benefit to this species of greatest conservation need.

The Willow Flowage Scenic Waters project, located in Oneida County 15 miles southwest of Minocqua, was established in 1997 to perpetuate the undeveloped character of the Willow Flowage and to preserve the scenic beauty, natural resources, and heritage for future generations. The flowage is nearly undeveloped and has a wilderness character over much of its area. It is famous for its scenic qualities, natural character, wilderness setting, and fishing opportunities. The project is managed to enhance the musky and walleye fishery, to protect the water quality of the flowage and to provide natural-type public recreational and educational uses such as fishing, hunting, hiking and trapping.

Summary:

The Department recommends the purchase of the all of the above-described properties totaling 1,529.46 acres to allow management for wildlife habitat, to insure public access for recreation, and provide resource protection. All parcels block well with existing department lands and will consolidate department ownership within the project boundaries.








