Chair Cole asked Brent Alderman, DNR IS Comprehensive Services Specialist, to the podium to give a background on the Mediasite recordings now being used at the Board meetings.

Mr. Alderman reviewed the recently implemented technological procedures for the Board and stated that they will provide on-going technical support.

1.B. Approval of agenda for May 21-22, 2013

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Bruins. The motion carried unanimously.

2. Action Items

2.A. Air, Waste, Water, and Enforcement

2.A.1. Approval of the Department's recommendation contained in the report to the Board on Wisconsin's State Mercury Air Emission Rule (PowerPoint)

Discussion followed as to what will happen to the other pollutants nitrogen dioxide (NO_x) and sulfur dioxide (SO₂), what these recommendations would do to the cost in producing electricity by the use of coal, and whether coal will still be competitive with natural gas when they get to 90% control.

Public Appearances:

1. **Eric Bott**, Madison, representing WI Manufacturers & Commerce could not attend.
2. **Robert Fassbender**, Madison, representing Great Lakes Legal Foundation. He spoke in support of the Department's recommendation to modify the state mercury rule to begin second phase emissions reductions on April 16, 2016 rather than the current January 1, 2015 compliance date. His handout to the Board was presented on behalf of WI Manufacturers & Commerce and the Great Lakes Legal Foundation. **(Handout)**

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED, seconded by Mr. Zimmer to approve the recommendation contained in the report to initiate rulemaking to modify the state mercury rule to begin second phase emission reductions on April 16, 2016, instead of on the current January 1, 2015 compliance date. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Information Items
- 3.A. Air, Waste, Water, and Enforcement
- 3.A.1. Department's FY 13-15 Biennial Research (PowerPoint)

Discussion followed on whether external groups will be included in the process, whether the money spent in each of these categories will be attached to the report, that emphasis on social sciences is extremely important to make better decisions for the future, and on research to manage and sustain ecosystems.

Mr. Cole asked for information by the June 2013 Board meeting as to what research the Department is participating in with regard to Urban Ecosystems Analysis. Any urban areas in the state.

1.C. Approval of Brief of Action from April 24, 2013

Mr. Bruins MOVED approval, seconded by Dr. Thomas. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B. Land Management, Recreation, Fisheries, and Wildlife

3.B.1 Request adoption of Board Order ER-27-11, proposed rules affecting Chapter NR 27 related to revising Wisconsin Endangered/Threatened Species List to remove 15 plants and animals and add 8 animals, and to update 20 scientific names (PowerPoint)

Ms. Wiley MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.2 2013 Conservation Congress Advisory Question Summary and Convention Report (Handout)

Discussion followed on whether the Conservation Congress has any protocols for minimizing disruptive behavior at the spring hearings.

3.B.3 Request adoption of Board Order FH-18-12, proposed rules affecting ch. NR 20, 21, 22, and 23 related to the Fish and Wildlife Spring Hearing changes to recreational fishing regulations on inland, outlying, and boundary waters (PowerPoint)

Discussion followed on what the basis was for opposition to the use of lead tackle, that restricting the use of lead tackle on Escanaba, Nebish, and Pallette lakes in Vilas County is a step in the right direction, on concerns raised in written comments to the Board regarding motor trolling on all inland waters with up to three hooks, baits, or lures, and whether the motor trolling item is enforceable.

Public Appearances:

1. **Rob Bohmann**, Racine, representing WI Conservation Congress as Chair stated their support for the Department's recommendations and to support an amended version of question 6 that would allow all the counties that voted in favor of trolling with three lines per angler to do so. All water bodies that already allow trolling would continue to have trolling. Those counties that wished to "opt in" to 3-line trolling could do so. The counties that voted against statewide trolling and do not currently allow any trolling would only be required to allow trolling with one line per angler. **(Handout)**

Discussion followed on whether a compromise of 2-line trolling instead of 3 should be looked at statewide.

2. **John Dettloff**, Couderay, representing Musky Clubs Alliance of WI. He spoke in opposition the statewide 3-line proposal for trolling. He asked the Board to consider aquatic invasive species concerns, boater conflicts, and stress on the fish. He is in favor of trolling with one sucker while musky fishing.
3. **Jim Olson**, Madison, representing self. He spoke in opposition to motor trolling. Data from the DNR shows that the risk of spreading aquatic invasive species doubles if a lake allows motor trolling. He approves what Mr. Dettloff said as a compromise. **(Handout)**

Mr. Cole asked Mr. Staggs to approach the podium.

Mr. Staggs gave a counterpoint on the comments from Mr. Dettloff and Mr. Olson.

Dr. Thomas MOVED approval of all items except for item #6, seconded by Mr. Zimmer. The motion carried unanimously.

Discussion followed on the WI Conservation Congress democratic process at the spring hearings on the motor trolling question.

Ms. Wiley MOVED to amend item #6, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski to implement the motor trolling compromise proposed by the Wisconsin Conservation Congress.

1. **Motor trolling with three hooks, baits or lures will continue to be allowed in all waters of those counties where it is allowed under current law, as follows: Ashland, Barron, Bayfield, Burnett, Dane, Douglas, Grant, Iowa, Lafayette, Polk, Price, Racine, Richland, Rusk, Taylor, Walworth, Washburn, and Waukesha;**
2. **Motor trolling with one hook, bait or lure per angler will be allowed in all waters of the following counties, except that motor trolling with three hooks, baits or lures per angler will continue to be allowed on any waters**

within these counties where it is allowed under current law: Door, Florence, Fond du Lac, Iron, Jackson, Lincoln, Marathon, Marquette, Menominee, Milwaukee, Oneida, Ozaukee, Sawyer, Sheboygan, Vilas, and Waushara;

- 3. Motor trolling with three hooks, baits or lures per angler will be allowed in all waters of those counties which voted in favor of Question 6 (to allow statewide trilling with three hooks, baits or lures per angler), as follows: Brown, Buffalo, Chippewa, Clark, Columbia, Dodge, Dunn, Eau Claire, Forest, Green, Green Lake, Jefferson, Juneau, Kenosha, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Langlade, Manitowoc, Marinette, Monroe, Oconto, Pepin, Pierce, Portage, Rock, St. Croix, Sauk, Shawano, Trempealeau, Vernon, Waupaca, and Wood Counties (Note: these are counties which voted in favor of question 6);**
- 4. Motor trolling with three hooks, baits or lures per angler will also be allowed in all waters of the following counties: Adams, Calumet, Crawford, Outagamie, Washington, and Winnebago (Note: These are counties which voted against question 6 but whose Conservation Congress delegations have indicated they would support being included among the counties that allow motor trolling with hooks, baits or lures given the other aspects of this compromise);**
- 5. The definition of position fishing in NR20.03(30) is retained to allow anglers to continue to position fish with more than one line in all lakes as they are allowed to do now;**
- 6. The sentence “Casting and immediate retrieval of a bait, lure or similar device while the motor is running or position fishing is not trolling.” is retained in the definition of trolling in NR20.03(40) to allow anglers to continue to position fish and cast from a boat with a motor running with more than one line in all lakes as they are allowed to do now.**

Discussion followed on whether the amendment was discussed with the WI Conservation Congress.

Mr. Bruins MOVED to table for 10 minutes to give the Wisconsin Conservation Congress Chair time to review the amendment, seconded by Dr. Thomas. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Bruins MOVED, seconded by Ms. Wiley to take from the Table Ms. Wiley’s amendment on Item 6. The motion carried unanimously.

Chair Cole asked Rob Bohmann, WI Conservation Congress Chair to the podium.

Mr. Bohmann stated that the amendment is in line with the WI Conservation Congress’ proposal.

Discussion followed on concerns for the counties that went for 0 or 1 lines and also that these are the state’s waters and its citizens deserve simplicity.

Ms. Wiley Called the Question.

Mr. Bruins requested that the department return to the Board after one year with an information item detailing their observations to the amendment for Item 6.

The motion to amend item #6 carried on a voice vote of 6 - 1.

- 3.B.4. Request adoption of Board Order WM-01-13, the Wildlife Management Spring Hearing rule Package affecting NR Ch.'s 10, 17, and 45 related to hunting, trapping, closed areas, dog training, and the management of department lands (PowerPoint)

Public Appearances:

1. Rob Bohmann, Racine, representing WI Conservation Congress as Chair. The Congress supported all but one of those proposals for NRB consideration with one amendment. Question 45 was amended to reflect a reduced youth fee. The Department in not recommending advancement of the overnight placement of stands or blinds on DNR managed lands and Congress supports that position. Congress delegation also voted to support the Department's 18 advisory questions and NRB advisory question #66 related to the full inclusion of crossbows in the archery season and rejected questions 67 and 68.
2. Adam Kassulke, Madison, representing WI Wolf Front. He spoke against the use of dogs in the wolf hunt.

Discussion followed on the status of the litigation with hunting wolves with dogs and on written comment received objecting to question 37 regarding simplification of the mink and muskrat trapping regulations.

Dr. Thomas MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski.

Mr. Hilgenberg stated that he continues to have angst about not letting older hunters to leave deer stands on public hunting lands. He asked whether the Department could do a trial run on properties north of Hwy. 64. He asked the department to give thought to do an analysis.

Mr. Zimmer MOVED to amend, seconded by Mr. Bruins as follows:

AMEND WM-01-03 BY EXTRACTING AND TABLING SECTIONS 6 AND 7 OF THE RULE ORDER PERTAINING TO MINK AND MUSKRAT TRAPPING SEASONS; AND DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT TO ENGAGE STAKEHOLDERS IN FURTHER DISCUSSION ON THIS PROPOSAL.

Analysis

Board Order WM-01-13 proposes that the mink and muskrat trapping seasons would open on the third Saturday in October and close on the Sunday nearest March 7 statewide except in the Mississippi River Zone, where the season opening date would not be modified.

This amendment would table that proposal to provide time for additional review. The rule could be promulgated later in a different board order. The

proposal would be removed from Board Order WM-01-13 so that the spring hearing rule will maintain the muskrat and mink trapping seasons established under current rule. Currently, the season dates for muskrat and mink trapping are:

- 1. 'North zone' — Beginning on the Saturday nearest October 17 and continuing through the last day of February.**
- 2. 'South zone' — Beginning on the Saturday nearest October 28 and continuing through the last day of February.**
- 3. 'Winnebago zone' — Beginning on the Saturday nearest October 28 and continuing through March 15.**
- 4. 'Mississippi River zone'— Beginning on the second Monday in November or the day following the close of the open season for ducks as established under sub. (1)(b)1., whichever occurs first, and continuing through the last day of February.**

The motion to amend carried unanimously.

The original motion as amended carried unanimously.

3.B.5. Request approval of department recommendations for the 2013 deer hunting season structure and antlerless quotas (PowerPoint)

Discussion followed regarding the deer population in units 35 and 36, concern that the bonus tag and holiday hunt did not significantly reduce the incidence and extent of CWD in Wisconsin, hope that the action team will come forward with something for the legislature to move the ball forward, and the need for good management tools to make a difference in the disease.

Chair Cole requested the department report back to the Board at the August 2013 meeting as to deer research in general and the ongoing process.

Discussion followed on Dr. Kroll's plan and the need to change the hunting culture in order to manage the disease.

Public Appearances:

1. **Ralph Fritsch**, Townsend, representing WI Wildlife Federation (WWF) spoke in support of the Department's recommendations. **(Handout)**

Discussion followed on whether WWF has any ideas on how farmers and landowners can work with hunters and the Department.

Mr. Zimmer MOVED approval, seconded by Ms. Wiley. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Thiede introduced the land items and distributed a map of today's real estate transaction requests (3.B.6 – 3.B.16.) and DNR managed lands and their proximity to people. **(Handout)**

3.B.6. Land Donation – Extensive Wildlife Habitat – Green County

Ms. Wiley MOVED approval and to acknowledge the donation, seconded by Dr. Thomas. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.7. Land Acquisition – Southwest Wisconsin Grassland & Stream Conservation Area – Iowa County (PowerPoint)

Discussion followed on land management that will be done by agriculture.

Mr. Bruins MOVED approval, seconded by Dr. Thomas. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.8. Land Acquisition – Baraboo Hills Recreation Area – Sauk County (Doug)

Discussion followed on the rationale of putting in more grass.

Mr. Kazmierski MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Zimmer. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.9. Land Acquisition – Northern Highland State Forest – Vilas County

Discussion followed as to who would potentially be competing bidders on this parcel, that timber companies are in a divesting mode right now which may reduce the public's public access opportunities, and whether the Department desires in the future to purchase the parcel to the south.

Ms. Wiley MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Zimmer. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.10. Easement Acquisitions – Forest Legacy Program – Adams County

Discussion followed on whether there are strings attached to federal funding, whether the Department's management plan would supersede the federal plan, and whether there are plans in the future to improve recreational and hunting opportunities.

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval, seconded by Dr. Thomas.

Public Appearances:

1. **Richard Steffes**, Madison, representing self. He spoke in support of the easement acquisition.

The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.11. Land Acquisition and Project Boundary Modification – Bibon Swamp Natural Area – Bayfield County

Discussion followed on justification of acquiring properties when the project is above the completion rate.

Dr. Thomas MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Zimmer. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.12. Land Acquisition and Project Boundary Modification – Paradise Valley Wildlife Area – Waukesha and Jefferson Counties

Discussion followed that this property will revert to a very wet area once the tiles are closed up and the ditches are filled.

Public Appearances:

1. **Pat Zimmer**, Waukesha, representing Pheasants Forever as Secretary of Southeast Chapter. He spoke in support of the purchase of the Kincaid Property and offered their help in managing that property in the amount of \$25,000 in the next five years as well as labor. They are also looking at leveraging this amount with partners to double it. They are also looking at renewing the financial assistance every five years.

Mr. Kazmierski MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Zimmer. The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.13. Land Acquisition – Paradise Valley Wildlife Area – Waukesha County

Mr. Bruins MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski.

Discussion followed on concern of this being a stand-alone property and that this is ideal hunting land.

The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.14. Land Acquisition – Sandhill Wildlife Area – Wood County

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval, seconded by Dr. Thomas.

Discussion followed on justification for purchasing property when the acquisition status of the project is 100% complete.

Dr. Thomas MOVED to table this item until after lunch to give staff time to research purchase justification, seconded by Mr. Zimmer.

Chair Cole moved the meeting to item 3.B.15.

3.B.15. Land Acquisition and Project Boundary Modification – Lower Wisconsin State Riverway – Grant County

A letter from State Senator Dale Schultz was distributed to the Board regarding payment in lieu of taxes (PILT). **(Handout)**

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval, seconded by Ms. Wiley.

Discussion followed on the last three bullets of Senator Schultz's letter regarding 1) signage, 2) enhancement of existing amenities to increase access and recreational

opportunities for local residents, and 3) the development of more amenities on riverway lands including ATV, ski, and others.

Steve Miller, Facilities and Lands Bureau Director stated that to meet the Board's concerns, they could report back in the short term with a timetable on the master planning process.

The motion carried unanimously.

3.B.16. Land Acquisition – Kettle Moraine State Forest – Loew Lake Unit – Washington County

Discussion followed on justification of the purchase price.

Mr. Bruins MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski. The motion carried unanimously.

4.A. Citizen Recognition

4.A.1. Rebecca Wallace Award (Handout)

Barb Bickford, Hydrogeologist and the Medical Waste Coordinator with the Department's Waste and Materials Management Program, is the recipient of the 2013 Rebecca Wallace Award (**PowerPoint**)

4.B. Open Testimony

Public Appearances:

1. **Rob Nurre**, Baraboo, representing Sauk Prairie Conservation Alliance
Topic: Badger Army Ammunition Plant/Sauk Prairie Recreation Area
He spoke with concerns that ATV trails and shooting ranges will be parceled into this property when ecosystem restoration should be the priority. (**Handout**)

Discussion followed on the Alliance's concerns.

Chair Cole returned the meeting to tabled item 3.B.14.

3.B.14. Land Acquisition – Sandhill Wildlife Area – Wood County

Dr. Thomas MOVED, seconded by Mr. Zimmer to take from the Table agenda item 3.B.14. The motion carried unanimously.

Chair Cole asked Mr. Haag to approach the podium and respond to the Board's Questions on acreage goals.

Mr. Haag responded to the acreage goal questions from the Board. He stated that in December of 2011, the Natural Resources Board approved the expansion of the Sandhill Wildlife Area project boundary to include the 1688 acre Yellow River Corridor. This action increased the acreage goal for the project to 11,233 acres. Upon approval of the plan the Department modified the GIS project boundary layer to reflect the expanded boundary but did not change the acreage goal in the land records system. With this acreage goal increase the project is currently at 84% of approved acreage goal.

Ms. Wiley Called the Question.

The motion to approve carried unanimously.

Mr. Zimmer MOVED approval, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski of the retirement resolutions. The motion carried unanimously.

- 5.B.1 Peninsula Golf Associates, Inc. will donate \$530,000 for a Golf Learning Center at Peninsula State Park

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval and to acknowledge the donation, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski. The motion carried unanimously.

Mary Thiesen, representing Peninsula Golf Associates, Inc., was in attendance to accept the acknowledgement of gift.

- 5.B.2 Oshkosh Area Community Foundation-Pete and Lucy Leach Fund will donate up to \$30,000 in cash to support an LTE position for building and grounds maintenance and repair at the state-owned property Leach Property

Dr. Thomas MOVED approval and to acknowledge the donation, seconded by Mr. Hilgenberg. The motion carried unanimously.

- 5.B.3 Ducks Unlimited and Dow AgroSciences will donate sunflower seed valued at up to \$18,062.50 to provide for increased hunting opportunities for bird hunters in Wisconsin

Dr. Thomas MOVED approval and to acknowledge the donation, seconded by Mr. Bruins. The motion carried unanimously.

Secretary's Matters:

Secretary Stepp summarized her experience touring the Germann Road fire area and then invited Trent Marty, Forest Protection Bureau Direct, to the podium to give the Board a summary of the Department's fire response (**PowerPoint**).

She then announced that the state received the Coalition for Recreational Trails' Achievement Award from the National Association of State Park Directors.

In closing, she highlighted the Governor's Walleye Initiative that will dramatically increase the number of walleye in Wisconsin to benefit all users, particularly in northern Wisconsin.

- 6.A. Air, Waste, Water, and Enforcement
- 6.A.1 Request that the Board approve the Statement of Scope for Board Order SS-22-12, revisions to Chapter NR 149, Wis. Admin. Code, proposed rules affecting ch. NR

149, Wis. Adm. Code, establishes requirements for laboratories participating in the laboratory certification and registration program

Mr. Bruins MOVED approval, seconded by Ms. Wiley. The motion carried unanimously.

- 6.A.2 Request that the Board approve the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-14-13, revisions required by the new ferrous mining law to chs. NR 130, 131, 132, 182, 500 – 555, 600 – 679, Wis. Adm. Code, and to other chapters that contain exemptions for nonferrous mining, as required by Section 103 of 2013 Wisconsin Act 1 (PowerPoint)

Mr. Hilgenberg MOVED approval, seconded by Dr. Thomas, and to proceed with the rulemaking process for rules required by the new ferrous mining law, 2013, Wis. Act 1, including approval to submit the proposed rule order to the Legislative Council Rules Clearinghouse by August 1, 2013 as required by Act 1, and approval of notice to submit such proposal to Legislative Council. Such approval does not affect the authority of the Natural Resources Board to modify the proposed rule order at the August 14, 2013 Board meeting on hearing authorization for this rule proposal, or Board authority to modify the rule proposal at any later date. The motion carried unanimously.

7. Board Members' Matters

- 7.A. Approval to reappoint 3 members of the Sporting Heritage Council

Chair Cole stated that at the February 27, 2013 meeting, the Board appointed 5 members to the Sporting Heritage Council, which was created by ACT 168. Because of the way the law was written, three of those five members have terms that expire on July 1, 2013. He had prepared letters to those three re-appointing them to new three year terms that will have them serving until July 1, 2016. He asked for and received the Board's consent to sign and mail the letters.

- 7.B. Board Member Requests

Dr. Thomas requested staff to look at ways to encourage use of non-lead tackle and ammunition on a voluntary basis and bring back to the Board as an information item and future action item.

Mr. Kazmierski asked that the Department consider opening state parks to additional archery hunting when the incidental closings by the Board's previous decision is looked at.

Mr. Zimmer stated that he appreciated the welcome he received from fellow Board Members. Their help, direction, and guidance were outstanding. He then acknowledged Board Member orientation coordinators Hilary Baumann and Laurie Ross, as well as all staff that participated last week. It was two fun filled, long days which gave him an eye opening look at the organization which was well expanded from what he was aware of. He also toured the command center and how the public communicates through that program. Staff were top notch and professional. He extended his thanks.

Chair Cole stated that we should not forget Mr. Zimmer's background, skills, and ability. We look forward to having you on the Natural Resources Board.

Ms. Wiley requested an “all things Stewardship” update at the June Board meeting to include legislative and funding.

Ms. Wiley noted the beautiful artwork that Jean Berens, DNR Customer Service Representative at the Wausau Service Center, did on the cover of the 2013-2014 Trout Fishing Regulations pamphlet.

Ms. Wiley stated that staff are working hard on coordinating the Wausau out-state meeting for June. She noted that there may be an opportunity to tour the Yawkey Museum <http://yawkeyhousemuseum.org/>. The Board and staff would be able to see how a lumber barron lived in 1905.

Dr. Thomas MOVED, seconded by Mr. Kazmierski to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried unanimously.
