Crestline to have cleaner air exhaust

A step to reduce smoke and soot from its heating operations is being undertaken by Crestline Co., Wausau, through conversion to natural gas heat.

The company plans to install a natural gas boiler about Nov. 1.

At present, the firm burns approximately 400 tons of sawdust, chips, and shavings per month as well as miscellaneous waste and rubbish.

Edward S. Seim, administrative vice president, said Crestline will spend about \$10,000 to install the new equipment.

"The use of natural gas will enable Crestline to eliminate much of the smoke and soot now going into the air through burning of production residue," he explained.

"Originally, every building was heated by burning this residue. But each new building has been connected to natural gas heat.

"With the final conversion, we can eliminate this type of burning entirely."

Seim said Crestline is investigating the market for wood scraps and feels the excess may

be converted for use in manufacturing plastics, wood flour or particle board.

Some burning of waste material and rubbish will still be necessary, he pointed out. Burning is necessary as the materials are not desirable at sanitary landfill sites.

Crestline is a manufacturer of wood windows and insulated, thermal doors. The company has sales outlets in 35 states.

The home office is in Wausau, with other operations conducted in Corry, Pa.; Ladoga, Ind.; and Petersburg, Va.
