

Section N: Accumulation in Tanks A. Tank: Assessment of existing tank system's integrity N.002: Assessment of existing tank system's integrity. If there is no existing tank system go to N.12. "Existing tank system" means a tank system that is used for the storage or treatment of hazardous waste and that is in operation, or for which installation has commenced on or prior to March 1, 1991. N.003: For each existing tank system that does not have secondary containment meeting the 665.0191(1) requirements of s. NR 665.0193, there is written assessment that is kept on file at the facility that was reviewed and certified by a qualified professional engineer in accordance with s. NR 670.011(4), that attests to the tank system's integrity. This written assessment was completed by January 12, 1988. N.004: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) considered the design 665.0191(2)(a) standards, if available, according to which the tank and ancillary equipment were constructed. N.005: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) considered the hazardous 665.0191(2)(b) characteristics of the wastes that have been or will be handled. N.006: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) considered the existing 665.0191(2)(c) corrosion protection measures. N.007: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) considered the documented 665.0191(2)(d) age of the tank system, if available, (otherwise, an estimate of the age). N.008: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) for non-enterable 665.0191(2)(e)1. underground tank considered the results of a leak test that is capable of taking into account the effects of temperature variations, tank end deflection, vapor pockets, and high water table effects. N.009: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0191(1) for enterable underground 665.0191(2)(e)2. tank and ancillary equipment consisted of at least one of the following: 1. A leak test that is capable of taking into account the effects of temperature variations, tank end deflection, vapor pockets, and high water table effects. A internal inspection. 3. A tank integrity examination that is certified by a qualified professional engineer in accordance with s. NR 670.011(4) that addresses cracks, leaks, corrosion, and erosion. Note: The practices described in the American Petroleum Institute (API) Publication, Guide for Inspection of Refinery Equipment, Chapter XIII, "Atmospheric and Low-Pressure Storage Tanks", 4th edition, 1981, may be used, where applicable, as guidelines in conducting the integrity examination of an other than non-enterable underground tank system. N.010: Tank systems that store or treat materials that become hazardous wastes subsequent 665.0191(3) to March 1, 1991 conducted this assessment within 12 months after the date that the waste becomes a hazardous waste. N.011: The generator complied with the requirements of s. NR 665.0196 when the results of 665.0191(4) the written assessment required under s. 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B. Tank: Design and installation of new tank systems or components	
N.013: For each new tank system or component the generator has a written assessment that was reviewed and certified by a qualified professional engineer in accordance with s. NR 670.011(4), that attests to the tank system having sufficient structural integrity and is acceptable for the storing and treating of hazardous waste.	665.0192(1)
N.014: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) considered the design standards according to which the tank and ancillary equipment were constructed.	665.0192(1)(a)

N.016: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) for a tank system having an external metal shell or any external metal component that is or will be in contact with the soil or water showed that a corrosion expert considered the following factors, including but not limited to, as potential sources for corrosion: 1. N.017: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) for tank a system having an external metal shell or any external metal component that is or will be in contact with the soil or water, showed that a corrosion expert considered the type and degree of external corrosion protection that are needed to ensure the integrity of the tank system during the use of the tank system or component. This corrosion protection consist of one or more of the following: 1. Corrosion-resistant materials of construction such as special alloys or fiberglass-reinforced blastic. 2. Corrosion-resistant coating (such as epoxy or fiberglass) with cathodic protection (e.g., mpressed current or sacrificial anodes). 3. Electrical isolation devices such as insulating joints and flanges. Note: The practices described in the National Association of Corrosion Engineers (NACE) standard, "Recommended Practice (RP-02-85)-Control of External Corrosion on Metallic Buried, Partially Buried, or Submerged Liquid Storage Systems", and the American Petroleum Institute (API) Publication 1632, "Cathodic Protection of Underground Petroleum Storage Fanks and Piping Systems", may be used, where applicable, as guidelines in providing corrosion protection for tank systems.	665.0192(1)(c)2.
N.018: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) considered vehicular traffic hat could potentially damage underground tank system/components.	665.0192(1)(d)
N.019: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) considered the tank bundation can maintain the load of a full tank.	665.0192(1)(e)1.
J.020: The written assessment required under s. NR 665.0192(1) considered if the tank system will need to be anchored to prevent flotation or dislodgement where the tank system is blaced in a saturated zone.	665.0192(1)(e)2.

S. Other structural damage or inadequate construction or installation. All discrepancies shall be remedied before the tank system is covered, enclosed or placed in use.	
N.024: The backfill material used for tank systems, components, and piping that are placed underground is a noncorrosive, porous, homogeneous substance and was carefully installed so that the backfill material was placed completely around the tank and compacted to ensure hat the tank and piping are fully and uniformly supported.	665.0192(3)
N.025: Tanks and ancillary equipment were tested for tightness prior to being covered, enclosed, or placed in use.	665.0192(4)
N.026: If a tank system is found not to be tight, all repairs necessary to remedy the leaks in he tank system were performed prior to the tank system being covered, enclosed or placed in use.	665.0192(4)
N.027: Ancillary equipment is supported and protected against physical damage and excessive stress due to settlement, vibration, expansion, or contraction. Note: The piping system installation procedures described in American Petroleum Institute API) Publication 1615 (November 1979), "Installation of Underground Petroleum Storage Systems", or ANSI Standard B31.3, "Petroleum Refinery System", may be used, where applicable, as guidelines for proper installation of piping systems.	665.0192(5)

Based on my inquiry of the person or persons who manage the system, or those persons directly responsible for gathering the information, the information submitted is, to the best of my knowledge and belief, true, accurate and complete. N.061: Ancillary equipment is provided with full secondary containment (e.g., trench, jacketing, double-walled piping) that meets the requirements of s. NR 665.0193(2) and (3). The following ancillary equipment is not subject to secondary containment: 1. Aboveground piping, excluding flanges, joints, valves, and other connections, that are visually inspected for leaks on a daily basis. 2. Welded flanges, welded joints, and welded connections that are visually inspected for leaks on a daily basis. 3. Sealless or magnetic coupling pumps and sealless valves that are visually inspected for leaks on a daily basis. 4. Pressurized aboveground piping systems with automatic shut-off devices, such as excess flow check valves, flow metering shutdown devices, or loss of pressure actuated shut-off devices that are visually inspected for leaks on a daily basis.	665.0193(6)(a)
N.062: The generator of a tank system that has been granted a variance from secondary containment under s. NR 665.0193(7)(a) in which a release of hazardous waste has occurred from the primary tank system but has not migrated beyond the zone of engineering control (as established in the variance) did all of the following:1. Comply with the requirements of s. NR 665.0196, except sub. (4). 2. Decontaminate or remove contaminated soil to the extent necessary to do all of the following a. Enable the tank system, for which the variance was granted, to resume operation with the capability for the detection of and response to releases at least equivalent to the capability it had prior to the release. b. Prevent the migration of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents to groundwater or surface water. 3. If contaminated soil cannot be removed or decontaminated in accordance with s. NR 665.0193(7)(c)2., then comply with the requirements of s. NR 665.0197(2).	665.0193(7)(c)
N.063: The generator of a tank system, for which a variance from secondary containment had been granted in accordance with the requirements of s. NR 665.0193(7)(a) at which a release of hazardous waste has occurred from the primary tank system but has migrated beyond the zone of engineering control (as established in the variance), did all of the following: 1. Comply with the requirements of s. NR 665.0196(1) to (4). 2. Prevent the migration of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents to groundwater or surface water, if possible, and decontaminate or remove contaminated soil. If contaminated soil cannot be decontaminated or removed, or if groundwater has been contaminated, the owner or operator shall comply with the requirements of s. NR 665.0197(2). 3. If repairing, replacing, or reinstalling the tank system, then provide secondary containment in accordance with the requirements of s. NR 665.0193 (1) to (6) or reapply for a variance from secondary containment and meet the requirements for new tank systems in s. NR 665.0192 when the tank system is being replaced. The owner or operator must comply with these requirements even if contaminated soil can be decontaminated or removed, and groundwater or surface water has not been contaminated.	665.0193(7)(d)
N.064: Interim measures for existing tanks without secondary containment. For non-enterable underground tanks that do not meet the requirements of s. NR 665.0193 there is an annual leak test that meets the requirements of s. NR 665.0191(2)(e). 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C. Tank: Containment and detection of releases	
N.065: Interim measures for existing tanks without secondary containment. For enterable underground tanks and any ancillary equipment that do not meet the requirements of s. NR 665.0193 there is an annual leak test that meets the requirements of s. NR 665.0191(2)(e) or there is a schedule and procedure developed that assesses the overall condition of the tank system by a qualified professional engineer. The schedule and procedure must detect obvious cracks, leaks, and corrosion or erosion that may lead to cracks and leaks. The generator must remove the stored waste from the tank, if necessary, to allow an assessment of the condition of all internal tank surfaces. The frequency of these assessments must be based on the material of construction of the tank and its ancillary equipment, the age of the system, the type of corrosion or erosion protection used, the rate of corrosion or erosion observed during the previous inspection, and the characteristics of the waste being stored or treated. Note: The practices described in the American Petroleum Institute (API) Publication Guide for Inspection of Refining Equipment, Chapter XIII, "Atmospheric and Low Pressure Storage Tanks", 4th edition, 1981, may be used, when applicable, as guidelines for assessing the overall condition of the tank system.	665.0193(9)(b)
N.066: Interim measures for existing tanks without secondary containment. The generator maintains on file at the facility a record of the results of the assessments conducted in accordance with s. NR 665.0193(9)(a) and (b).	665.0193(9)(c)
N.067: Interim measures for existing tanks without secondary containment. If a tank system or component is found to be leaking or unfit-for-use as a result of the leak test or assessment in s. NR 665.0193(9)(a) and (b), the generator complied with the requirements of s. NR 665.0196.	665.0193(9)(d)

N.073: The generator must inspect, where present, at least once each operating day, data gathered from monitoring and leak detection equipment (for example, pressure or temperature gauges, monitoring wells) to ensure that the tank system is being operated according to its design.	665.0195(1)



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E. Tank: Inspections	
N.074: The generator inspects at least once each operating day all of the following: 1. Overfill and spill control equipment (for example, waste-feed cutoff systems, bypass systems, and drainage systems) to ensure that it is in good working order. 2. Above ground portions of the tank system, if any, to detect corrosion or releases of waste. 3. The construction materials and the area immediately surrounding the externally accessible portion of the tank system, including the secondary containment system (for example, dikes) to detect erosion or signs of releases of hazardous waste (for example, wet spots, dead vegetation). Section NR 665.0195(3) deals with generators who use either leak detection equipment to alert facility personnel to leaks or implement established workplace practices to ensure leaks are promptly identified, shall inspect at least weekly those areas described in this requirement. Under s. NR 665.0195(3) Wis. Adm. Code, weekly inspections are permitted when there is either leak detection equipment to alert facility personnel to leaks or there are established workplace practices to ensure leaks are promptly identified.	665.0195(2)
N.075: A generator may conduct weekly inspections to those areas described in s. NR 665.0195(2)(a) to (c) (see item N.073) when the generator has leak detection equipment to alert facility personnel to leaks or the generator has established workplace practices to ensure leaks are promptly identified. N.086: Any release to the environment (except for a leak or spill of hazardous waste that is less than or equal to a quantity of one pound and immediately contained and cleaned-up.) must be reported to the department within 24 hours of detection. If the release has been reported pursuant to ch. NR 706, that report will satisfy this requirement. Note 1: The department may, on the basis of any information received that there is or has been a release of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents into the environment, issue an order under s. 291.37 or 291.85, Stats., requiring corrective action or other response as deemed necessary to protect human health or the environment. Note 2: See s. NR 665.0015(3) for the requirements necessary to remedy a failure. Also, if a hazardous substance is released to the environment, 40 CFR part 302 may require the owner or operator to notify the national response center and s. 292.11, Stats, and ch. N.087: Within 30 days of detection of a release to the environment a report required under s. NR 665.0196(4)(a) was submitted to the department that contained all of the following information: 1. Likely route of migration of the release. 2. Characteristics of the surrounding soil (soil composition, geology, hydrogeology, climate). 3. Results of any monitoring or sampling conducted in connection with the release, (if available). If sampling or monitoring data relating to the release are not available within 30 days, these data shall be submitted to the department as soon as they become available. 4. Proximity to downgradient drinking water, surface water and population areas. 5. Description of response actions taken or planned.	665.0196(4)(c)
N.088: Spill with no damage to secondary containment system: Prior to returning the secondary containment system to service the generator made any necessary repairs to secondary containment system and removed any released wastes within the secondary containment system.	665.0196(5)(a)
N.089: Leak from a tank to the secondary containment system: Prior to returning the tank to service the generator made any necessary repairs to the tank.	665.0196(5)(c)
