

The Wetland Study Council: A brief guide for legislators

About the Wetland Study Council

The WSC was created in 2017 Act 183. Wisconsin Statute 15.347(22) explains council membership, terms, and charge.

The WSC was created to research and develop recommendations on a broad range of wetland-related topics. The statutes specify some topics for research, and the council may choose other topics at its discretion. Recommendations may include statutory, administrative, or communications improvements.

The Wetland Study Council is a resource for policymakers

The WSC is designed to be a multi-perspective resource for policymakers and encourages the consultation with and use of the broad range of expertise offered by WSC stakeholders in the crafting of thoughtful, common-sense wetland policies.

WSC members include those offering diverse perspectives in municipal, conservation, agricultural, development, and other aspects affecting wetlands.

There are many ways to interact with the Wetland Study Council

Attend a meeting – WSC Meetings are open to the public and generally available to attend via Zoom or in-person. The [DNR Public Meetings Calendar](#) lists upcoming WSC meetings, which are generally held on the second Thursday of every other month starting in January.

Follow WSC legislative recommendations – Visit the WSC webpage to review legislative recommendations endorsed by the WSC.

Suggest a topic - Tap into the diverse perspectives offered by WSC members on wetland related issues. The WSC may add the topic to a meeting agenda, discuss, research, and provide a summary of the discussion.

Questions about WSC involvement in legislation

Does WSC take positions on legislation? The WSC does not take positions on legislation except when the WSC has researched and made a recommendation for a legislative change and the legislation follows that recommendation.

Does the WSC testify or register on proposed legislation at legislative hearings? The WSC does not testify at legislative public hearings, but individual WSC members may register or testify on proposed legislation in representation of their own association or firm.
