## BRULE RIVER STATE FOREST

*Managed to provide: places to have fun, resource protection, wildlife habitat and products we need—like paper and wood.*

**ORIGIN:** In 1907, Frederick Weyerhaeuser donated land to begin a forest reserve along the Brule River. The State Forest was established in 1932.

**FOREST CHARACTERISTICS:** Find a variety of habitats, including unique boreal forest remnants, pine barrens and northern hardwoods.

**ACTIVITIES:** The 44-mile-long Bois Brule River is famous for trout fishing and canoeing. Hiking, cross-country skiing, camping and hunting are also popular.

**UNIQUE FEATURE:** Brule Bog is the headwaters for the St. Croix River, a national wild and scenic river, and the Bois Brule River, a world-class trout fishery.
