


Jackson County - State Lands

Purpose of Sale:

To perform intermediate treatment thinnings on three stands of red pine to improve tree health and growing space.

Cutting Specifications: In Zone 1, cut all trees marked with orange paint. In Zone 2, cut every third row of red pine.

Special Operating Requirements and Slash Disposal:

1. Unmarked red pine stands should be thinned by cutting every third row.
2. The edges of the red pine plantations are the sale boundaries, with the exception of a blue paint line on the east boundary of stand 3, which denotes a private land boundary. Do not fell trees across paint lines and do not cut painted boundary trees.
3. **This sale requires the Purchaser to complete Annosum root rot preventive treatment if harvested April 1- Nov. 30. Treatment must be performed by a Certified Pesticide Applicator. Treatment involves chemically treating all fresh-cut stumps of pines of merchantable size by applying either Sporax (sodium tetraborate decahydrate) or CELLU-TREAT (disodium octaborate tetrahydrate). Treatment shall be made the same day as harvest and a dye product shall be added to liquid solutions for inspection purposes. The cost of this application can vary based on application method and harvest conditions, but should be considered when submitting bids on these timber sales.**
4. No biomass harvesting is allowed on this sale due to poor soil fertility.
5. All pine products cut between March 1st and August 30 must be removed from the sale area within three weeks from time of cutting. Pine products cut during the remainder of the year must be removed before March 15th.
6. A trail/road runs through the north part of this sale and must be kept in useable condition for public use. Any tops or slash dropped on the trail must be removed to prevent safety hazards to trail users.
7. Slash must be evenly lopped/scattered within the sale boundary and shall be deposited a minimum of 10 feet from the mowed right-of-way of any highway, town road, or recreational trail. Slash within 50 feet of all town roads and recreational trails must lie within 2 feet of the ground. Do not bury seedlings or saplings with slash.

General Requirements:

1. All designated tree species must be cut and forwarded concurrently with the sale.
2. All stumps shall be no higher than the stump diameter, or 10 inches, whichever is less.
3. Do not cut or knock down any dead or hollow trees. These are important wildlife habitat. Any that must be cut shall be left in big pieces on the forest floor.
4. Utilization: cut and use all designated trees with one or more 100" sticks to a 4" top diameter.
5. Notify the DNR forester before you start the job, and each time you pull out or return to the job.
6. Any new roads and all landings must be approved by a DNR forester before operations begin.
7. Any berms removed during harvesting operations must be put back to the satisfaction of the DNR Forester.
8. Any trees cut or pushed over for new roads or landings must be utilized or cleaned up to the DNR Forester's satisfaction.
9. **Wisconsin's Best Management Practices for Invasive Species applies – contractor must clean equipment before entering and leaving the sale area! This involves brushing away all dirt and cleaning air intakes of debris.**
