

Buckhorn Trails

Central Sands Nature Trail (1.5 miles)—Ten interpretive signs have been placed along the way to help you learn about this sandy area.

Turkey Hollow Trail (1.5 mile) runs into the Central Sands Nature Trail. It also will take you to backpack sites 4-7 and 13-15.

Partridge Trail (1 mile) begins and ends at the Hunter Parking Lot A near the T intersection. It also connects to the Turkey Hollow Trail and winds through an oak woods. Watch for pileated and red-headed woodpeckers; they're quite a sight. This trail will take you to backpack sites 17-19.

Oak Barrens Nature Trail (1.5 mile) leads you through oak and pine barrens and prairie areas. A short portion is paved and accessible.

Turtle Trail (.4 mile) leads to the kids' fishing pond. A fishing pier built by area Eagle Scouts is there, and the Friends of Buckhorn stocked the pond with bluegills, catfish, and bass.


Canoe Interpretive Trail (1.5 mile)—Bring your canoe or kayak or rent one at the park and explore the canoe interpretive trail. Ten numbered posts along the shoreline mark points of interest. At the canoe launch or office, pick up a brochure describing these sites. The 1.5-mile trail usually requires 60-90 minutes, but plan for more time.

Buckhorn Campground Trail (.53 mile)—A crushed rock trail for walking or biking leads from the campground towards the day use area.



