


What it means for deer hunters in Wisconsin.

#### Standard Season Structure - Statewide

#### **Archery and Gun License Tag Availability:**

- Central and Southern Farmland Zones: One buck and one antlerless tag per license. Starting in 2015, hunters will need to designate the unit and the land type (public or private) for the antlerless permit included with the license. Additional antlerless tags may be purchased if available.
- Northern and Central Forest Zones: One buck tag issued with license. Additional antlerless tags may be purchased if available.
- Additional antlerless tags: \$12 statewide and will be unit (county) and land type (public vs. private) specific. The number of public vs. private land tags will be based on the goal and the percent of deer range in each land type in the unit.



### **Deer Management Units**

- Consolidate the number of DMUs using county boundaries as DMU boundaries.
- Eliminate State Park Zones statewide
- CWD-affected area Identified by county boundaries consistent with the state statutes that identify the baiting & feeding regulations





What it means for deer hunters in Wisconsin.

#### **Deer Management Advisory Committee**

- Establish a Deer Management Advisory Committee in each county in 2014 that would hold "herd status" meetings to evaluate local data regarding the deer herd. The Committee will begin making recommendations to the Department for the 2015 Deer Seasons.
- Membership may vary by county based on interest with potential membership to include:
  - Conservation Congress
  - Agricultural
  - Forestry
  - Tourism
  - Transportation
  - Urban (City/Village) Representative
  - Tribal Representative (Ceded Territory)
- The DMU population goal for each DMU is proposed to switch from a specific overwinter population goal of deer per square mile (e.g. 25 deer/mi<sup>2</sup>) to an objective of increase, stabilize or decrease that would be evaluated every 3 years. All Northern and Central Forest DMU's will have an increase objective for 2014 and all Central and Southern Farmland DMU's will have a stabilize objective for 2014.
- The recommendation for the DMUs objective would be based on a variety of metrics or categories of data that could include:
  - Deer Health indicators
  - Deer Impacts on other natural resources
  - Societal impacts
  - Information provided from hunters (deer seen/hour of effort)
  - Population model estimates
- Three members of the county deer management advisory committee are required to have held a license authorizing deer hunting in 7 of the previous 10 years.

## **Deer Management Unit Herd Management Options**

- Bonus Buck available as an option starting with the 2015 season in the Southern Farmland only.
   ("Bonus Buck" regulations allow a hunter to harvest an additional or "bonus" buck if they have harvested an antierless deer prior to harvesting the bonus buck.)
  - Harvest 1 antlerless/1 bonus buck
  - 3 buck max total
- Issue extra antlerless permits for sale above the historic number sold for the unit.
- Increase the number of antlerless permits with deer license purchase
- Implement 4-day October antierless gun hunt in disease-affected areas only by emergency rule process
- Allow the addition of the holiday hunt by any county that doesn't already have it.

## **Other Proposed Program Changes**
