State of Wisconsin

Excerpt from the *Forest Legacy Program Assessment of Need (AON)* for use in explaining what is defined as a threat to conversion of Wisconsin's private forestlands. Use this list in answering question 10.

"In discussing the definition of Wisconsin's environmentally important forests, it was clear that considering both internal and external threats to the sustainability of these forests was integral to their identification and protection. These threats are impacting the lands within the selected Forest Legacy Areas. The threats that contribute wholly, or in part, to the fragmentation and loss of the contiguous blocks of forest system include:

- a. Homes and residential development within the forest.
- b. High property taxes.
- c. Rapid turnover of property.
- d. Forest industry restructuring.
- e. Urban sprawl.
- f. Easy access from metropolitan areas.
- g. Changes in State On-site Waste Disposal Codes
- h. Deer populations. "
