

# Wildlife Rehabilitation Protocol – Disposal of Carcasses and Animal Waste

Our general protocol for animal carcass and animal waste disposal is (attach additional sheet if necessary):

- Injured or sick adult deer and fawns from any county where deer rehabilitation is prohibited are humanely euthanized. Heads from adult deer are collected and stored at refrigerator or freezer temperature. Contact with the local Wildlife Manager or Conservation Warden is made within 72 hours to submit the head for testing. See Deer Rehabilitation Policy for further explanation

## Special Cases

- Animals euthanized with chemical agents are disposed of in a manner to ensure they will not be accessible for other animal consumption or contamination of the environment. Our method of disposal in these cases is as follows:
- Necropsy procedures are established and followed. Species we necropsy and the procedures we follow are provided below or attached on a separate sheet:
- We have the necessary permits to rehabilitate State Endangered/Threatened Species. If we receive an animal on the list, we will contact the Bureau of Endangered Resources to report the admission and receive instructions on what to do with the carcass if the animal dies.
- All eagle carcasses are submitted to the National Eagle Repository unless otherwise directed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
